## Families to splash $£ 1.56$ billion on school summer holiday spending spree

Forget climbing trees and hide and seek, new research from VoucherCodes.co.uk reveals British parents are due to spend a whopping $£ 1.56$ billion splashing out on expensive day trips, visits to theme parks and meals in restaurants to keep their children entertained during the school summer holidays.

- Nearly one in 10 rack up credit card debt to pay for expensive trips
- Quarter of families use discount vouchers
- Half of parents worry about the cost of the summer holidays
- Theme parks are number one summer day out for kids

The study, which polled children and their parents, revealed this breaks down as:

More than half of parents ( 51 per cent) admit the pending cost of the summer holidays is keeping them awake at night. One in three ( 33 per cent) confessed they don't know how they're going to afford to keep the children entertained over the long break and one in six (17 per cent) expressed concerns about covering the cost of childcare. Nearly one in 10 ( 8 per cent) admit to putting the cost of expensive trips on a credit card. Almost a third of savvy Brits ( 30 per cent) have already started saving to pay for activities throughout the six week break.

The research also quizzed kids about their favourite activities to take part in this summer. Although visiting theme parks and going to the cinema remain firm favourites, parents don't have to splash the cash as kids also rate cheap and cheerful activities highly, with day trips to the beach or park and fun with arts and crafts also making the top five.

Children's top five activities for the school summer holidays are:

1. Visiting theme parks
2. Going to the cinema
3. Day trips to the beach or a park
4. Playing sports

## 5. Arts, crafts and baking

The city set to splash the most cash during the school summer holidays is Wrexham; however residents are also the savviest with $43 \%$ of people surveyed stating they'll use vouchers to make trips more affordable. Second on the list of big spenders are families from Liverpool with Londoners in third place. Those from the capital are also the most likely to turn to credit cards (16\%) to enable them to afford the school holidays. Swansea families are fourth on the list when it comes to a summer holiday splurge and York parents take the fifth spot.
